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PERIPHERAL REVIEW

was founded in 2016 on a free wordpress template by Lauren Lavery and Adriana Lademann, two recent art school graduates with a vision to engage the emerging art community in Vancouver, B.C. They co-wrote a manifesto inspired by Roland Barthe's notion of the "punctum" from his book Camera Lucida and endeavoured that the website would work to document all of the exhibitions and events going on in the city that was being left out by art publications, while simultaneously opening up an accessible place for experimentation in art writing for those on the so-called "periphery."

Six years later, with over 120 reviews, interviews, essays and experimental responses published in our archive, PR now has a brand new website to call home and has outgrown its DIY origins. Although still small and DIY in operations, PR is still run by Lauren Lavery and is sustained mainly from various project grants, independent donations and publication sales. The inagural online auction in 2022 is the platform's first attempt at raising money away from grants, and we need your help to meet our ambitious future programming and publishing projects, including a guest-edited digital chapbook series, our annual print edition, exhibition at international art book fairs, and to be able to continue to pay fair CARFAC-standard fees to our contributors and staff.

By bidding and purchasing a work in our online auction this year, you are helping PR reach our goal of paying fair contributor fees and disseminating our publishing projects from now into the future, allowing us to continue to represent, and give space for, accessible and experimental critical dialogue on art, artists and spaces considered underrepresented, or "peripheral."

Thank you for your interest in supporting *Peripheral Review* and our roster of artists. We are grateful for your readership and commitment to the emerging Canadian art community.





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








